

Through our wig grants, Variety provides specialised, custom-made wigs made from real hair to kids who have lost their hair due to a medical condition such as alopecia, cancer and trichotillomania.

This year we granted **52 wigs to** children who have lost their hair living in NSW/ACT, increasing their confidence and self-esteem.

Losing your hair can have profound psychological effects, particularly through childhood and adolescence. One specialised wig can cost up to \$6,000 and lasts two to three years, making the cost prohibitive for many families.

Thanks to you, Kyla received her custom-made wig

Kyla loves jumping on the trampoline, riding her bike, and like so many 12-year-old girls, she loves to dance!

Kyla's mum Belinda says Kyla is always looking to help others, so it came as no surprise when she chose to donate her hair to Variety's Hair with Heart program in November 2019.

"It had taken her about three and a half years to grow her hair long enough, so we were all thrilled when she finally got there. We waited until after her dancing concert and in the end, she donated 42cm of hair, as well as the money she had fundraised for Variety," said Belinda.

Then in February 2020, Kyla's sister found a perfectly round, bald patch on the top of Kyla's head.

What began smaller than the size of a 10-cent coin, quickly grew and two weeks later Kyla was diagnosed with Alopecia Areata.

"It was really upsetting for me because I didn't really know how much was going to fall out," said Kyla.

Belinda said it was so incredibly difficult watching Kyla struggle with the diagnosis as she couldn't do anything to make it better.

"I shaved my head with her twice but that didn't stop hers falling out."

When Kyla first started asking about a wig, Belinda swung into action and began researching options but quickly realised the family faced yet another hurdle.

"I was quite shocked to find out a wig was going to cost close to \$5000! We just hadn't had a chance to save for those sorts of things."

Fortunately, Freedom Wigs suggested Belinda approach Variety for support and both Kyla and Belinda were thrilled when the wig arrived – just in time for her Year 6 Formal.



This year, we granted **23 We Join Community grants** to support kids to join in with their communities, no matter their circumstances. Schools and organisations are invited to apply for grants up to \$10,000 to purchase equipment that will promote access and inclusivity in the community for children aged 0-18 years.

It's incredible to see the look of absolute joy on the face of a child as they're wheeled to the beach and into the sea.

Thanks to you, everyone can go to the beach.

A day at the beach is one of life's simple pleasures. The sun on your back and the water lapping at your feet can brighten up anyone's outlook on life.

But people living with a disability can't always navigate the sand and the surf. Particularly if they're in a wheelchair.

Getting on to the beach can be tough, which means they don't get to experience that feeling of freedom on the beach that the rest of us take for granted. But life's looking up for people heading to the NSW south coastal area of Tuross Head for their next family holiday.

With the help of Variety, the Local Progress Association has purchased an all-terrain beach wheelchair. And at nearly \$5,000, she's a beauty.

The wheelchair enables children and adults with no other means to access the sand or sea onto the beach, and into the water. It has made a huge difference to so many people who live and holiday in this picturesque neck of the woods. A handful of locals regularly use the wheelchair too.

Progress Association Honorary Secretary John Tilbrook reckons the wheelchair promotes access and inclusivity, and he's proud as punch.

"It's incredible to see the look of absolute joy on the face of a child as they're wheeled to the beach and into the sea. Often, it's one of just a handful of times in their entire life that they've been able to enjoy the feeling of weightlessness in the ocean. Their whole face lights up as they enter the water," John says.

The new wheelchair arrived just in time for summer, replacing a wheelchair that was more than two decades old. The old model is now out of production, meaning spare parts were hard to come by.

This new set of speciality wheels will serve the local community well for another two decades, or more.

Now, a day out at the beach at Tuross Head will be a real day out to remember. For everyone.

Our We Move grant funded 18 grants delivering life-changing specialist equipment to kids living with a disability. Your support helped get this equipment to children who were unable to access them through statutory services such as the NDIS, increasing their physical development, independence and social inclusion and, ultimately, joy!

Thanks to you, Jax can safely play outdoors

Belinda uses the word 'big energy' to describe her son Jax. Throughout the day, the seven-year-old has the overwhelming urge to move, run, jump and play.

He might sound like most other kids his age. Except that Jax has severe autism.

Emotional regulation is challenging for Jax. He displays frequent and extreme movement-seeking behaviours. Sitting still is rare.

Quite simply, he has a much higher threshold for movement than others his age. His needs are significant.

The little boy's movements are high intensity, which can be unsafe at times when he uses tools not designed to meet his movement needs, Belinda explains.

"His sensory-seeking behaviours are a lot. He frequently seeks movement at a high intensity and struggles to regulate his behaviours," she explains.

Specialists suggested a climbing frame for him, Belinda knew that she could never afford to purchase it given the exorbitant price tag. So, Variety stepped in, and it's been a complete gamechanger for Jax. The little boy adores it, heading out into the yard to play on it several times a day. Here, Jax can safely expel all that energy inside him and jump, climb and run. It's been a game-changer.

Belinda was keen to find a school that would be inclusive of Jax and bring out the best in her son.

The family has relocated to a property with more land so that Jax has more safe space to run and play.

The teacher taught the other students to hold their hands out for Jax when he was indicating that he wanted to communicate. It made a huge difference to how he feels in the classroom, she says.

The teacher also answered questions from students and ensured Jax was included in activities throughout the school day.

Of course, Belinda sees a kid that never stops laughing. He's got bright red curly hair and big blue eyes. He loves the water and adores his dogs and horses. Outdoor play is crucial for Jax.

VARIETY SUNSHINE COACHES

This year, your support allowed us to deliver **7 Variety Sunshine Coaches** to organisations who cater to kids with a physical disability, living in regional communities or experiencing social disadvantage, to enable them to access the community and to experience a range of special programs and activities.

Variety Sunshine Coaches can be fitted with wheelchair modifications, ensuring that all children can attend excursions and extra-curricular activities together.

"Thanks to this gift, the 100 students at Cranleigh School, who live with a range of disabilities, will be able to take part in their education on the same basis as their peers. A student's disability will not disadvantage their education as they will be able to engage with the wider community during excursions.

The Sunshine Coach will literally bring sunshine to the lives of our students, as it can be used for excursions, sporting events and other educational activities."

You helped Layla make her dreams a reality

Breaking running records comes naturally for Layla. She can run like the wind, and nothing will stop her from pursuing her dreams.

It's remarkable given that Layla is legally blind. She has tunnel vision. This means that she has no peripheral vision.

Put simply, Layla will never be able to drive. She struggles with vision fatigue when she concentrates for too long.

But there's no doubt that Layla will go far in life. Layla doesn't spend much time thinking about her disability. She's got too many races to run. There are running records yet to break.

All Layla needs is someone to believe in her, and a bit of support along the way.

She's determined to do well at anything she puts her mind to. She's not only excelling in athletics, she's also academically gifted.

"School is just like a racetrack to her, so she's in the gifted class and

tries her best every day."

On the running track, she's beating people two years older than her to the finish line. She dashes past able-bodied athletes at a rate of knots.

One day, she wants to represent Australia at the Commonwealth Games and Paralympic Games. It's a lofty goal, but she's well on her way.

Having the support from Variety has meant the world to her. Layla has been the recipient of a Variety Heart Scholarship, which helps cover the costs of racing at the elite level. The cost of travelling to events adds up, not to mention entry fees and uniforms.

As to the future, it's hard to know what lies ahead. Layla's eyesight could stabilise, or it could worsen. The doctors can't tell just yet.

In the meantime, Layla's determined to put her best foot forward.



ACTIVATE INCLUSION

Variety Activate Inclusion Sports Days, run in partnership with Sport NSW and delivered by Disability Sport Australia, are a free, fun, and inclusive day of sport catered to kids with a physical disability, living in regional communities or experiencing social disadvantage.

Held during school terms, Activate Inclusion Sports Days gave over 1,300 kids the opportunity to try sports they might otherwise miss out on. Aimed at kids aged 5-18 with learning difficulties, intellectual, sensory & physical disabilities, the days are an opportunity to have a go in a fun and inclusive environment.

We are thrilled to partner with Sport NSW and Disability Sport Australia on this important program.

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REGIONAL SPOTLIGHT

We continue to focus on reaching all kids and supporting families and communities, regardless of how remote or regional they may be. Children who must travel great distances for medical appointments, educational opportunities and sporting competitions often face challenges and that's where we come in making sure that all kids can attain their full potential, regardless of their background.

This year, 25 grants were given out to children in over 40 schools across regional NSW and ACT. Our motoring events have a long tradition of giving participants the chance to explore country towns that aren't always on the map. Our Bash cars are renowned for bringing fun and excitement to farflung corners of the country and bringing smiles to the faces of local families who rarely have visitors.

Moreover, we also bring thousands of dollars in grants to local schools for much needed technology, playground equipment and educational resources. Not to mention the tourism dollars injected into regional communities with lunch and overnight stops along the routes.

Thank you to all our incredible fundraisers who engage their wider community to help to fund our grants, programs, and scholarships for kids in need! We are grateful to our amazing partners and supporters for making the dreams of so many children a reality.



VARIETY POSTIE BIKE DASH

Our incredible Dashers raised a record-breaking amount for kids in need, with over \$30,000 of equipment and resources granted to 7 schools along the breathtaking route through the Snowy Mountains region.



VARIETY ADVENTURE RIDE

32 Riders, including 19 new entrants, travelled from Tamworth to as far as Ballina and back again, granting \$25,000 of equipment and resources to 3 schools along the way.



VARIETY 4WD ADVENTURE

31 4WD vehicles and 83 Adventurers kicked it up a notch this year with two identical events, granting \$8,775 of equipment and resources along the route.



VARIETY NSW BASH

This year marked the 30th anniversary of the NSW Bash with 300 people across 97 Bash cars, including 18 new cars, raising an incredible amount for kids in need. Over \$50,000 of equipment and resources were granted to 9 schools and organisations along the route.



VARIETY BRYDENS LAWYERS BUNGARRIBEE TO BAKERS CREEK BASH

After two years of cancellation due to Covid, this year's B to B Bash raised a record amount, and granted \$93,175 of equipment and resources along the epic route to 17 schools and community groups.







In Newcastle, more than 1000 children, as well as their families and carers made their way through our 2nd Xmas Toy Drive-Thru. Over 400 cars took part in the special event which offered a chance for everyone to experience the magic of the festive season – without leaving their vehicle. The excited kids arrived with windows down to take in the spectacle of roving characters, Newcastle Knights players and

cheerleaders, Bash cars and postie bikes before receiving a wave from Santa and Mrs Claus and a free Xmas gift from Variety.

We are grateful for the support of our volunteers who helped bring the event to life and for the generosity of our event sponsor, The Wests Group, as well as McDonald Jones Stadium and local Woolworths stores who supplied goodie bags to giveaway.
